

So...just what is the FOUNDATION Event Facility?

In 1899 in downtown Bristol, Tennessee, Mr. H.P. King built the largest department store within a 200-mile radius of Bristol. The H.P. King Department Store was considered the jewel of the Appalachian region. That jewel has now been transformed into Allen Hurley's FOUNDATION Event Facility and 620 State Restaurant, owned and operated by Vision, LLC, which is part of the Allen Hurley companies.

Hurley, who was the president and cofounder of Touchstone wireless, truly believes in the Bristol community and in the statement, "Build it and they will come."

"I want people to get the full experience of Bristol, which includes bringing different

ideas together to attract people to the things that are already here," he says. "We are the Birthplace of Country Music, and no one else can say that! I don't want to just build a destination. I want Bristol to be an experience for all who live here and all who visit our great city."

Hurley continues, "I believe that in order to build our downtown, we've got to have the infrastructure in place for people to visit, including nice buildings and key restaurants. It's a pretty simple business model. You build relationships, keep your word and believe that internal processes deliver external promises. If you strive for those things and have the infrastructure available, things will keep moving forward.

"Having BTES' one-gigabit-per-second Internet services available to every business and every home in the BTES service area is one infrastructure that is helping Bristol move forward. To be able to call BTES — which is a local company with local employees — and quickly have that fast service available is almost unheard of in the United States. Having that fast bandwidth available opens many doors for our community," Hurley adds.

BTES provides state-of-the-art fiber optic services to the FOUNDATION Event Facility, which provides high-definition television, crystal-clear telephone service and ultra-high-speed Internet connections to the building.

"Internet is what the world is today," Hurley says. "BTES understands that and provides excellent ultra-high-speed Internet connections."

These ultra-high-speed Internet connections recently allowed the facility to host a worldwide meeting from downtown Bristol. The meeting host required Internet speeds of a true, continuous 1 Mbps.

Many suppliers say "up to" a certain speed, but it is not continuous at this speed. BTES' Internet speeds are actual "true" speeds, meaning that the speed provided is continuous.

Hurley explains, "Since BTES already had the FOUNDATION Event Facility set up with 30 times the required minimum speed with their 30 Mbps Internet

A Letter to Answer Our Customers' Questions

Every week, almost 2,000 customers communicate with us, mostly by telephone calls. This figure also includes visits to our office and e-mails. This does not include the 33,000 bill payment events per month.



Communication is one of the best skills a person can develop. I believe good communication exists when one person has a picture in his/her head. He/she uses a set of words to describe it, and the other person hears those words and the exact same picture pops up in his head. Seldom does this happen where the picture is the same. Many times it is not even close.

We all have had different life experiences. Every profession has its own specialized language. BTES has a lot of specialized language. Therefore, the same words often give us vastly different pictures. We know that it is our duty to make the picture in your head match ours and the picture in our head match yours. This means we have to carefully use words to draw the picture so that we see the same thing.

Good communications is necessary to successfully resolve the issue at hand. We then review these 2,000 communication events per week to find ways to prevent those communications from having to happen.

Why is it important for us to answer your questions without you even having to call us or come by? This could save you time and inconvenience.

For instance, we may have 50 people call us within a week to find out if we received their payment. We now can e-mail you and/or send you a text message when a payment is made on your account. **See Page 5 for details.**

I use our convenient bank draft and recieve only an e-bill. It comes one to three days earlier than a bill through the U.S. Postal Service. Later an e-mail and text message tell me when it is due. The payment will be deducted from my bank account on the due date. I receive an e-mail and a text message telling me the payment has been posted to my account. Questions are answered without my asking or taking any additional actions.

You don't have to use bank draft to use the e-mail and text message system. It just saves you and BTES more time and money.

Our goal is to answer your questions if possible before you even ask. This can make your life more hassle free and save money in the process.


The app is available on either the Apple App Store or the Android Market on your smartphone or device by searching for "BTES."

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BTES Receives Top State Award!

BTES has earned the prestigious Excellence Award in the annual Excellence in Tennessee recognition program administered by the Tennessee Center for Performance Excellence (TNCPE).

This is the second time BTES has claimed the top award. Since the program was founded in 1993, only 22 organizations have attained the Excellence designation. The Metropolitan Nashville Airport Authority will also receive the Excellence Award this year.

TNCPE is Tennessee's only statewide quality program patterned on the Baldrige Performance Excellence Program, the national standard for recognizing organizational excellence. TNCPE will officially present BTES with the award at the 20th Anniversary Excellence in Tennessee Awards Banquet on Feb. 20, 2013.

"BTES has been using the TNCPE and Baldrige framework for continuous improvement for more than 20 years," says BTES CEO Mike Browder. "We are very proud to be recognized as an Excellence Award winner."

Through an annual evaluation and assessment process, TNCPE recognizes high-performance organizations that exhibit continuous improvement and best practice processes. The TNCPE Award program is open to companies and nonprofit organizations throughout Tennessee.

"I want to thank Bristol Tennessee Essential Services for its commitment to improvement and excellence," says Tennessee Gov. Bill Haslam. "For 20 years, TNCPE has been helping organizations become more efficient and effective; and BTES, in partnership with TNCPE, is doing its part to help build a stronger, better Tennessee."

Organizations like BTES apply to the TNCPE program at one of four levels. As the levels increase, so do the depth and complexity of the application, which is based on the Baldrige Criteria for



Performance Excellence. Organizations submit a self-assessment based on questions posed in the criteria and can range from five to 55 pages, depending on the award level sought. BTES submitted a 55-page application to be considered for the level 4 Excellence Award and then hosted a three-day site visit for a team of examiners. If there is not an organization that meets the depth and complexity of a level 4 Excellence Award recipient, no award is given at that level for that year.

In addition to BTES and the Metropolitan Nashville Airport Authority receiving the level 4 Excellence Award, nine organizations will be honored with the level 3 Achievement Award; 22 will receive a level 2 Commitment Award; and, to date, two will receive the level 1 Interest Recognition. They represent outstanding achievement in the following industry sectors: health care, manufacturing, service, education, government and nonprofit.

"This program helps organizations look at the big picture," says TNCPE President Katie Rawls. "But it's not easy — if it were, every organization in the state would be participating.

"Organizations like BTES are truly passionate about performance excellence and have chosen TNCPE and the Baldrige framework to help them become the best run organization they can be."



2 large chicken breasts, chopped into small pieces

Brown and drain hamburger. Add remaining ingredients and bring to a boil. Serve with sour cream and cheddar cheese.



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Tree Care and Maintenance

Trees have many practical benefits. They are natural air filters — removing dust and greenhouse gases. They can trim your energy bills as much as 20 percent! They improve the value of your property and provide wildlife habitats and shelter, reduce soil erosion, promote a healthy environment and enhance quality of life.

There are many different types and shapes of trees. They grow at different rates and need different types of soil and nutrients.

It is very important to take power lines into consideration when planting a tree. Always ensure that the future size of the tree will never interfere with power lines. Trees can retain their natural beauty if they don't have to be trimmed to protect the safety and reliability of the power lines.

Tree trimming is one of BTES' major expenses. Help us reduce this cost that must be borne by all our customers. Choose the right tree and the right location — which is not under or near the power lines.

BTES' tree-trimming policy is in place to ensure the reliability of our services while considering the safety of the general public, BTES employees and contractors. This policy also helps control costs associated with emergency repairs to downed lines.

BTES' tree-trimming policy is listed below. For further information, please visit www.btes.net.

BTES Tree-Trimming Policy

- 1. The lateral pruning method shall be employed by BTES and its contractors in all trimming operations performed on BTES right-of-ways.
- 2. Final trimming and right-of-way clearing shall provide a minimum of 10 feet of unobstructed space (any direction) from BTES overhead conductors, including the system neutral.
- 3. BTES shall place an emphasis on tree removal(s) in lieu of periodic maintenance and recurring trimming operations.
- 4. BTES does not remove the stump when removing a tree. BTES will cut the stump at a height to allow removal of the stump by the customer or will cut the stump as low as possible.
- 5. BTES may offer customers a low-growing replacement tree in exchange for the removal of a fast-growing existing tree that is obstructing or otherwise endangering a BTES overhead power line. In such case, BTES shall make suitable arrangements with an approved tree nursery to provide and professionally install a three- to four-foot dogwood tree at a location satisfactory to both BTES and the affected property owner.
- 6. Customers may, at their own expense, elect to arrange for a professional independent contractor to trim or remove trees on their property, in lieu of BTES or its contractor(s) performing the same services where said trees will pose a threat to BTES' overhead power lines if neither trimmed nor removed. Contractors need to be insured and certified to work near high-voltage lines.
- 7. BTES' Tree-Trimming Program does not include provisions for trimming trees which overhang or are otherwise growing near low-voltage service wires. However, in the interest of safety, BTES may, with prior arrangement, de-energize these lines and temporarily lower them to the ground to allow the customer to trim or remove the trees. Once the customer has finished, BTES will reconnect the customer's service line.
